What Are You Looking For?

By this time last year on the 12-month Gregorian calendar, we had already celebrated Easter. We had sung powerful hymns of the resurrection, returned "Alleluia" to our regular vocabulary, and enjoyed spending time with family, friends, and church members rejoicing in Jesus' victory over the grave. But not this year. This year, we still have three weeks of Lent left before we hear of Mary Magdalene, Joanna, and Mary taking the spices to the tomb to tend to Jesus' body, when two men in dazzling apparel startled them as they asked, "Why do you seek the living among the dead?" (Luke 24:5b) In other words, "What are you looking for?"

Our congregation is in the Southern District of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod (LCMS). The Southern District is a very large geographical district compared to the other districts in the LCMS because the density of Lutherans and Lutheran churches in the South is much lower than the density of Lutherans and Lutheran churches in other parts of our country (particularly the Midwest). The Southern District holds a convention once every three years where we hear reports from our Synodical President and Southern District President, elect officers and board members for our district, consider resolutions for the Southern District to adopt, and consider additional resolutions for the Southern District to send to the LCMS Convention for consideration. As is often the case, this year the Southern District Convention was held in Slidell, Louisiana (a six hour drive that takes eight hours when you have a flat tire like we did).

Each congregation in our District is expected to send one pastoral delegate and one lay delegate from their congregation to hear the reports and vote on the various matters. The elections go quickly, and then come the resolutions. Of note at this convention was a resolution to no longer hold District Conventions in the season of Lent. That resolution passed with a resounding applause from all of the pastors. There was also a resolution that was presented and debated on to replace "Easter" with "Resurrection Sunday" in all LCMS publications (including hymnals). That resolution was soundly defeated. The word "Easter" will remain a part of our liturgical calendar.

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This was the fifth District Convention that I have attended (one English District Convention and four Southern District Conventions). "What are you looking for?" was the essence of the question the two men in dazzling white asked the women at the tomb of Jesus, and after so many conventions I know exactly what to look for at a convention. There is a lot of sitting and some voting. There are some reports that provide helpful and interesting information, and some reports that you would rather not hear.

This year, however, I came across something that I was not looking for — at least not at a district convention. This year, part of the schedule at the convention was dedicated to breakout sessions where delegates were presented with material and techniques that might be helpful for their ministry. In those breakout sessions, I found something that I was not looking to find at a district convention. I heard a presentation called Missionary Pathway. Missionary Pathway is a method... a technique for equipping the body of Christ with the skill and confidence to be missionaries wherever they are. The idea is to have missionaries in the workplace, on the soccer field or baseball diamond, at the gym, in the book club, at the local coffee shop, and wherever Christians might be. The idea is that wherever you find Christians, you also find Christ being shared with others. But this idea was not just an idea, it came with a method for developing the body of Christ into everyday missionaries. It sounded perfect for Grace Lutheran. Pastor Andrew and I look forward to embracing Missionary Pathway at Grace in the near future. Sometimes God helps you find things that you are not even looking for to further His Kingdom, and we think that is what He is doing with Missionary Pathway. Get ready — Missionary Pathway is coming to Grace.

Free Throws and Habits of the Heart

But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control; against such things there is no law. And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. If we live by the Spirit, let us also keep in step with the Spirit.

Galatians 5:22-25

"You have made us for yourself, and our heart is restless until it rests in you." -St. Augustine Confessions

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We are creatures of habit. Our lives are full of habits; good, bad, and otherwise. We wake up and have a routine. We go to work and have a routine. We come home and have a routine. We end the day and we have a routine. Each of these routines are habits, and these different habits shape who we are, how we think, and how we live in the world. These habits and routines help us make sense of life, and when we miss these habits, it throws us off.

With so much basketball on recently, I can't help but think about free throws. These shots are some of the most important in a game. They can totally change a team's momentum, and countless games have been decided because of a team's ability, or inability, to make their free throws. Each player has their own habit about how to shoot a free throw. They do the same thing each time. They might roll their shoulders. They might spin the ball in their hand. They might bounce the ball three times. But it's always the same thing because these habits are critical to them being comfortable and able to make these shots. If the game comes down to the wire and they were to suddenly change their pre-shot habit, they'll likely miss because these habits are so ingrained in them.

In our life with God, we have habits as well. We have a weekly habit of going to church. We have a habit of learning with other Christians through Bible study. We have a habit of prayer. We have habits that shape our life to follow Jesus. What happens when we miss these habits, when we forget to do these holy habits? Like Augustine wrote back in the 5th century, our hearts are restless. When I get wrapped up in my other vocations and responsibilities, I find that my heart becomes restless too. Psalm 42:1 shares this restlessness, "As a deer pants for flowing streams, so pants my soul for you, O God." Our hearts yearn for and are restless for God. Where do our hearts find their flowing streams?

Augustine again gives us the answer. Our hearts are restless until they find rest in God. Our habits, good, bad, and otherwise, shape how we live our Christian life. If you want to make your free throws, you have to practice making your free throws the same way every time. If you want to grow closer to God, check your habits. Being in the season of spring, just like you might prune a plant, where do you need to prune your heart habits? What holy habits do you need to cultivate?

Paul encourages the Galatians in their holy habits. Love, joy, peace, patience... all of these are holy habits grown by and cultivated by the Holy Spirit. Like free throws, these are habits for us to practice as we follow Jesus. Practicing these habits, our hearts find their rest as we sit by the flowing stream of God's Word and promises. This month, as we live by the Spirit and keep in step with the Spirit, take one of these holy habits and practice it. See how God shapes you, how he forms your life, and how he moves you to follow him more closely.

May God bless your heart and the habits that flow out of his love as you follow him.

LOCAL MISSION ENGAGE CONNECTIONS

Grace Lutheran has developed a relationship with McDonnell Elementary School (4010 Binderton Place, Huntsville, AL 35805). We have been advocates for the school and open to responding to needs as they are shared with us. We are still stocking their Little Library with children's books. The library has been moved nearer to the school building as it was knocked down twice recently. We have a need for children's books, activity books, and basic school supplies. You can support this project by contributing gently used children's books or providing such items as commercially wrapped individual snacks (examples: Cheez-It crackers, Lance sandwich crackers, Rice Krispy or granola bars). Books and school supplies along with food supplies may be placed in the chest in the church narthex. Thanks for your generous support as you respond in the love of Jesus.



First Stop encounters the homeless where they are, connects them to critical services and support, and empowers them toward independent sustainable living. So far this year, the First Stop team has successfully assisted 53 individuals from homelessness to independent, sustainable living. These are 53 people who are no longer living on the street but are sleeping in the safety and comfort of their own homes.

First Stop relies on volunteer support to provide hot meals twice a day at the temporary facility location – 2820 Governors Drive.

Volunteer Tips for providing meals:

- Meals should serve 80-100 people. Prepare food for 80 people! 3-4 servers are needed to serve the meal.
- Provide food that is already prepared and only needs to be heated. No cooking, please.
- We serve Breakfast and Lunch, Monday through Friday. Breakfast meals are to delivered to **First Stop** by 7:45 AM and lunch meals by no later than 11:15 AM.
- Breakfast is served from 8:30 AM to 9:30 AM.
- Lunch is served from 12:00 PM to 1:00 PM.

Saints Alive is an adult organization within Grace Lutheran Ministries. The group is open to Grace Lutheran members and their friends. The organization hosts two activities each month on the first and third Wednesdays. Always sign up on the sheets on the narthex easel. There is a little change for the sign-up sheets going forward. There will be two sheets, one will be for those riding the bus and the other for those who are planning to drive themselves. This just makes it easier for us to keep track of when the bus is full.

Busy Spring!

We are going to be doing things a little differently on our trips in the future. Several times recently we have run into a school carpool issue when returning from a trip. So, the decision has been made to start and end each trip from the Gibson's parking lot. We will park near the Parkway, and the bus will meet us there. If a restroom is needed, the bus will take us to the back door of the old gym to use the restroom before we leave on the trip. That means that being on time is even more important!

Spring brings beautiful scenery and nice weather, so the Saints Alive have some activities planned to help you enjoy spring. On April 2nd we planted and picked lettuce at the **Manna House Hydroponic Garden** in Lacey's Spring. We had a great turn-out for the trip.

On **April 17th** the Saints Alive Members will travel to Fort Payne to visit **Orbix Hot Glass**. Orbix is a small glass studio nestled in the humble mountains of Alabama. This day is a change from our normal outings as Orbix has changed the day when they give demonstrations from Wednesday to Thursday.

Because the glassblowers cannot demonstrate for us until 1:00 PM, we will first go to lunch at **Vintage 1889**, a locally-owned and operated restaurant located in the 134-year-old historically-registered Big Mill Company building in Fort Payne. Following lunch we will visit the glass blowing company gallery and possibly purchase something. Then we will tour the studio and watch as glass artists give a private glassblowing demonstration. The artists will answer questions about the Process as well. The cost of the tour depends on how many people attend as there is a set cost for the group to come. The bus will leave from the church at **9:15 AM**. We will be back in time to attend the Maundy Thursday worship service. We will also share in the gas money for the bus. Donna Behnken and Kris Wyszynski are the coordinators of the trip. Sign up in the narthex.

On **May 7th** we will visit a new museum in Huntsville. **Signals - Museum of Information Explosion** just opened in Huntsville on University Drive near Red Lobster. The museum provides a hands-on, immersive experience where guests can explore, interact, and learn about communication technologies throughout history. Visitors will leave the museum with more appreciation for the business leaders and inventors alike that have paved the way for the digital technologies we rely on today. The cost of the tour is \$10. More information will be coming about lunch and departure time. Karen Crout is the coordinator for the trip.

On **May 21st** the group will visit the **Huntsville Botanical Garden** where we will have a tour. There will be shuttles available for those folks who don't want to walk on the tour. We will also have a group rate. Lunch will follow at Back Forty Brewery on Leeman Ferry Road.

Repeat... Repeat Again

What's that? What's that? Why? Why? It's easy to become tired of the repeated questions of a toddler. However, repetition is the way we humans learn. Every parent and teacher knows that repetition reinforces learning. For parents, about the time you feel you're a broken record with your requests of your child, they suddenly follow through on the request without prodding.

We are all God's children. I'm sure glad that God doesn't get tired of repeating the same thing to me as his child. Jesus often repeated himself, sometimes to the point of exasperation. After telling a parable we hear the exasperation of Jesus in Matthew 15:16, "But Peter said to him, 'Explain the parable to us.' And he said, 'Are you also still without understanding?'" Jesus told his disciples he would die and be raised from the dead on at least three separate occasions, and they still were not prepared for it when it happened.

The Bible is full of questions and God's reminders. Jesus knew that important things needed constant reminders and taught his disciples the importance of preaching and reminding people of His teachings. As God's children, we should never dismiss a subject or teaching based on having heard it before. In 1 Corinthians 8:2 we are told, "If anyone imagines that he knows something, he does not yet know as he ought to know." We may know a teaching. It is when we put a teaching into practice that we truly demonstrate we have "learned" His teaching. Paul's reminders to the Corinthians of the gospel they had heard and believed were to confirm the truths of the gospel so they would not drift from them. By each of us staying in His word, we continue to confirm and grow as Christians with hope.

God repeats himself often in the Bible. He knows we need to be told the same things several times before the lesson sinks in. Our lives are filled with ever-changing circumstances, and familiar lessons or teachings can take on a new meaning as we mature in our faith. God gave Jesus as a teacher and demonstrator of a sinless sacrifice. He tells us repeatedly in Acts 1:11, Matthew 24:30, and Revelation 1:7 that Jesus will return with power and glory and for us to be ready.

As we celebrate this most holy time of Easter, may we watch for the many reminders in the Bible of our hope in the resurrection of our Lord and Savior and the promises of Jesus' return.

May God guide and strengthen our Stephen Ministers and GriefShare facilitators as they serve and pray for members of our congregation and the community.


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Men's Ministry Service Activity

During their monthly meeting in March, the Men's Ministry group gave the Grace buses a good cleaning. Thank you men for your hard work!








Lenten Worship Begins
